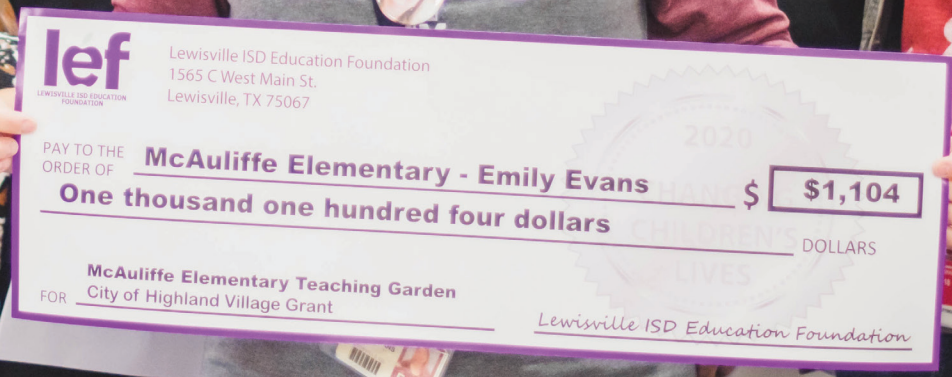
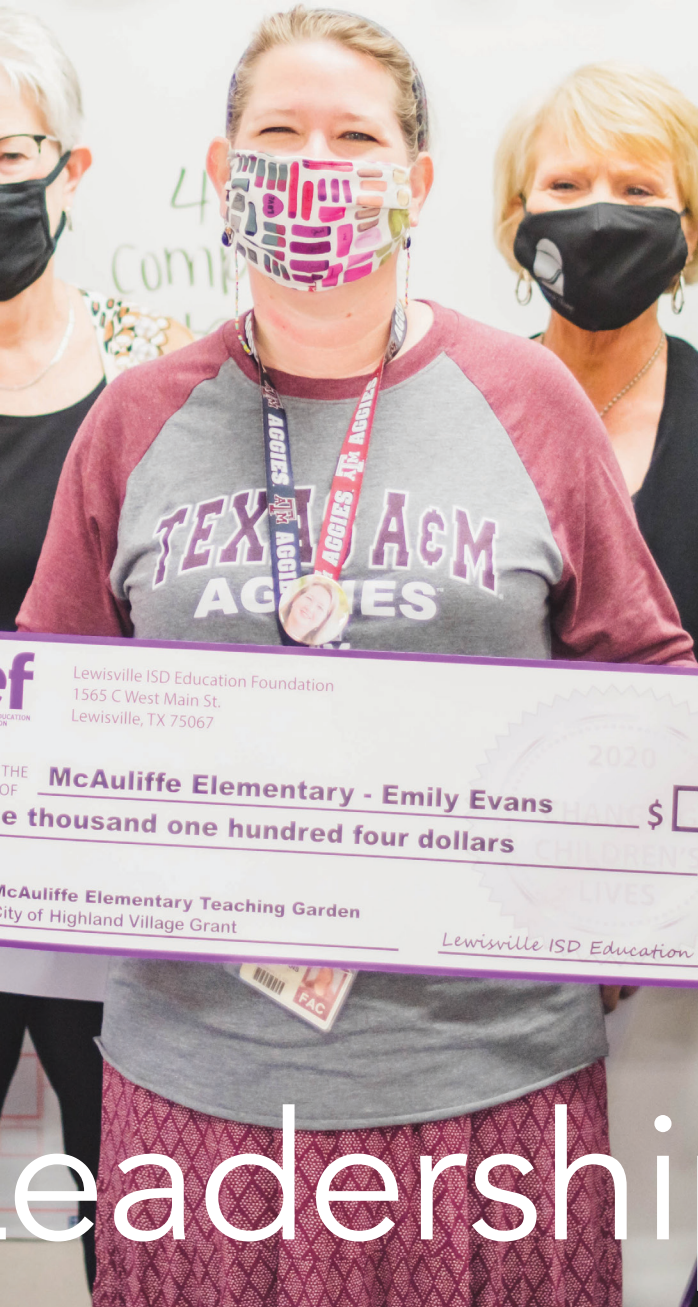

Dallas Arboretum: On The Go!

Stewart's Creek Elementary Learns All About 'A Bug's Life'

In a little more than three hours on October 1, 2020, more than 65 teachers on 47 different campuses were surprised with grant awards totaling \$103,000. The timing of the awards couldn't have been better as LISD teachers were learning to adapt to new classroom environments and overcome obstacles caused by the COVID pandemic.

One such teacher was Dina Estes, 1st Grade Science teacher at Stewart's Creek Elementary. Her original grant application was for a "Garden On The Go" program through the Dallas Arboretum which would provide an Edible Plant Parts classroom lab for her students to participate in. Unfortunately, due to COVID restrictions and safety protocols, this program was no longer a viable option, but Estes and her class were able to pivot.

"The Dallas Arboretum and Botanical Garden has several Garden on the Go programs," Estes said. "We found another program that would be engaging, support our TEKS for Science, be COVID-safe and fun!"

A presenter for the "It's a Bug's Life" program read aloud to students and helped them learn how to identify different body parts of an insect, followed by an inventory of bugs, including a live tarantula, that students were able to safely see up close.

"During the program, students were all raising their hands and making connections to what we had learned in the classroom related to animals and their features. This was a great program to build on what we have learned in science and provide an enriching experience for students."

Even as COVID threatened to derail the learning in Estes's classroom, her ability to quickly adapt and donor generosity like yours helped her students thrive in new ways.

#LEFScholarships Goes Viral

The Community Rallied to Celebrate the Class of 2021 Online

The Lewisville ISD Education Foundation awarded \$243,835 in scholarships to graduating LISD seniors during the 2021 awards season.

Each year, community volunteers blind review more than a thousand student applications to select the winners. This year, 342 scholarships were awarded to aid students seeking higher education or vocational training.

"I plan on using the money from this scholarship to help me attend the University of North Texas in the fall," said LHS senior and recipient of the Gordon Lee Christensen Memorial Scholarship, Joseph Purcell. "I am very grateful to the Christensen family for their generosity in granting me this scholarship."

Despite the cancellation of the traditional, in-person scholarship awards ceremony, the community rallied and celebrated each student's success virtually throughout the week of April 19th through the 23rd.

All recipients received a yard sign, sponsored by DATCU, to display their achievement. Through student submissions, pictures and videos were assembled for a virtual ceremony dedicated to each high school.

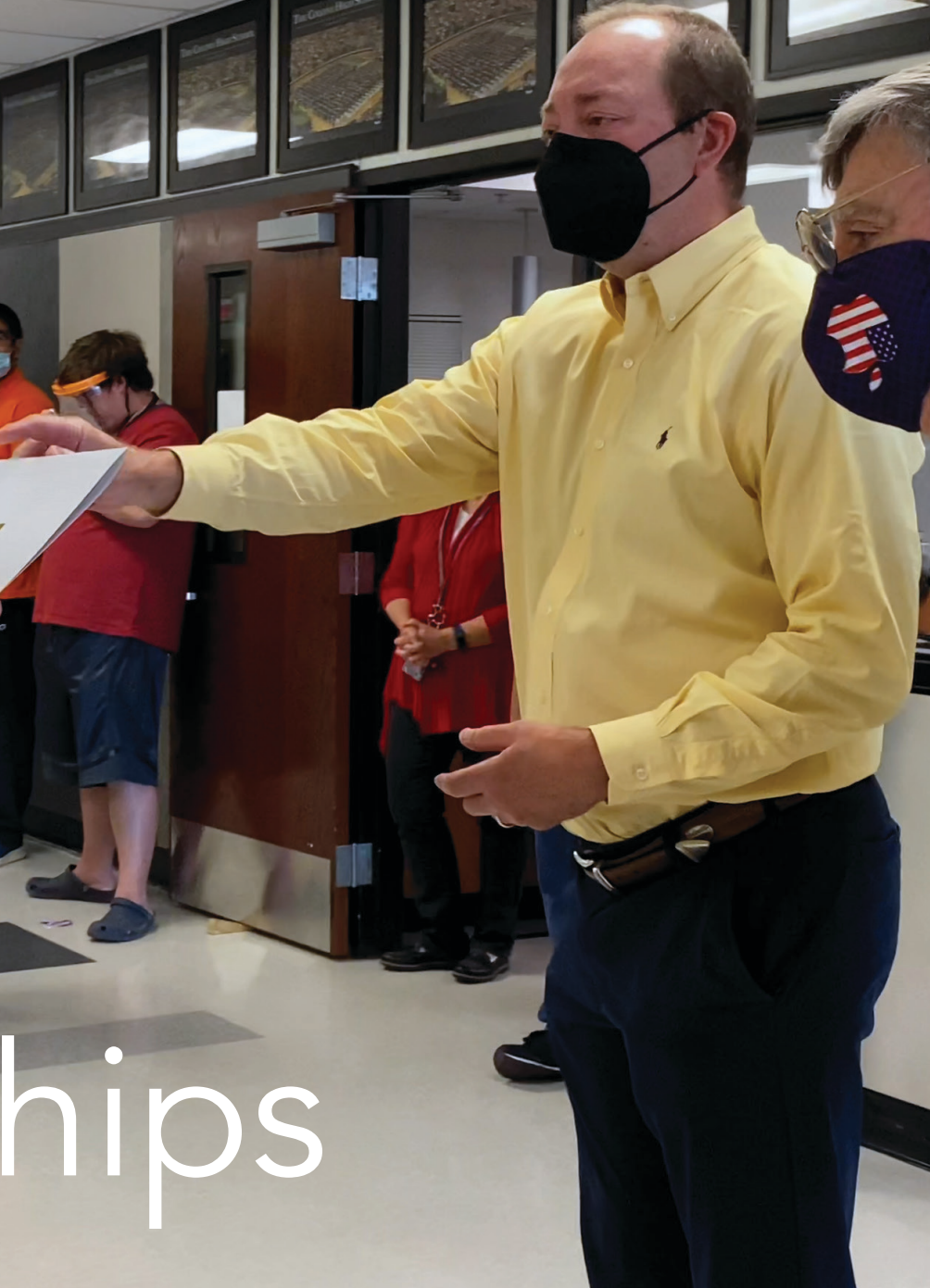
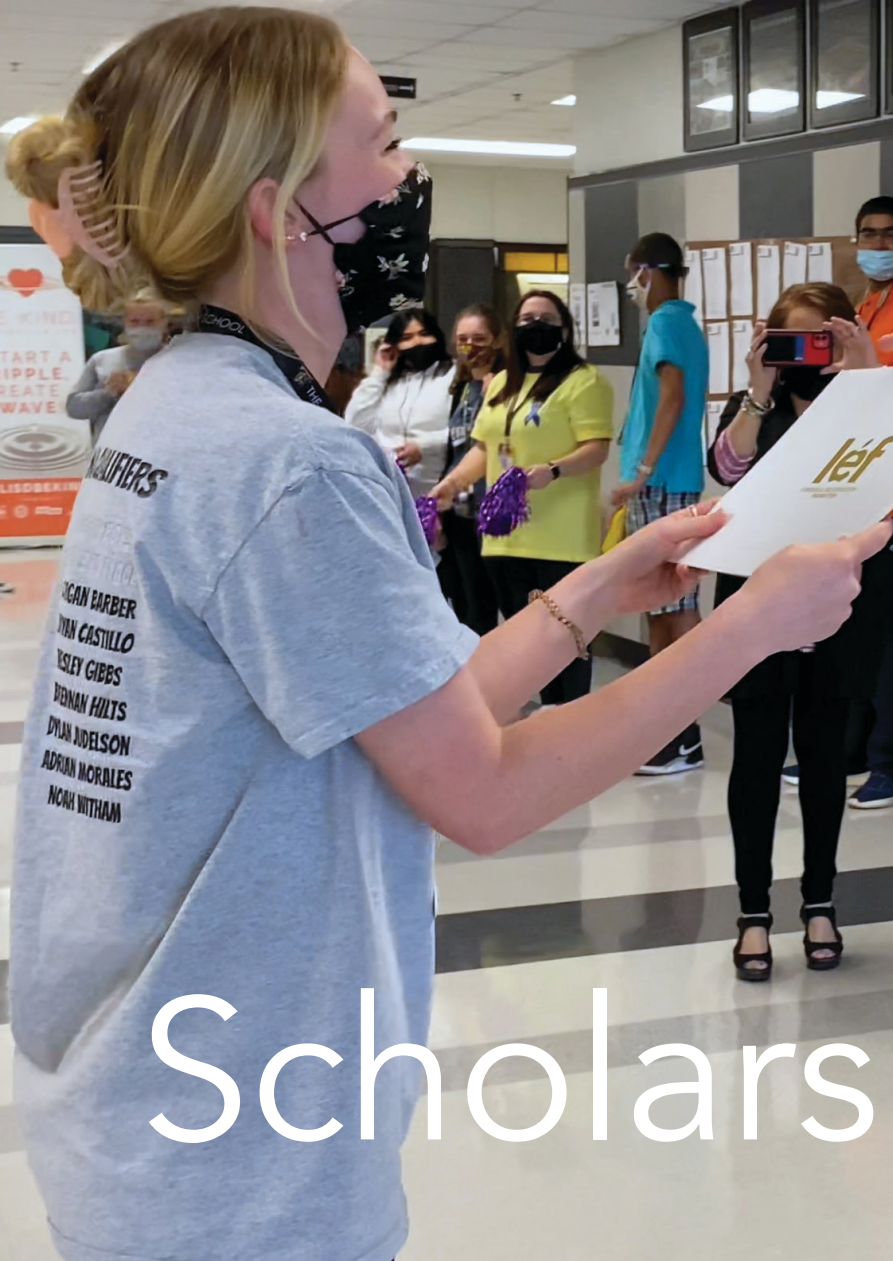

A Partnership Made For All Students

Back To School Fair Serves Thousands In the Middle of Global Pandemic

There is no down time during the year when it comes to planning the Back To School Fair. Once the big day finally comes and goes, it's immediately back to work for the group of LISD employees and community advocates who work diligently all year to fundraise and collect supplies.

This school year was no exception. In fact, they had to work harder than ever as the number of students who were registered for free backpacks and supplies increased from the normal 5,500 to 7,200.

On top of that, the Fair couldn't be hosted in the traditional in-person format since safety protocols had to be closely followed.

LEF partnered with multiple LISD departments and community organizations to raise \$84,000 and coordinate more than 600 volunteers organizing 250,000 school supply items. Backpacks were delivered to each campus and distributed to registered families from there.

"This event is a massive undertaking each year, and could not happen without many exceptional community partners, volunteers, and the work of the LISD Counseling and Social Work Services Department," said LISD Superintendent Dr. Kevin Rogers. "I am proud that despite the challenging circumstances, we were able to serve more than 7,200 families this year."

Even during a global pandemic and uncertain times, our community compassionately and graciously stepped up to ensure thousands of our students started the school year successfully.

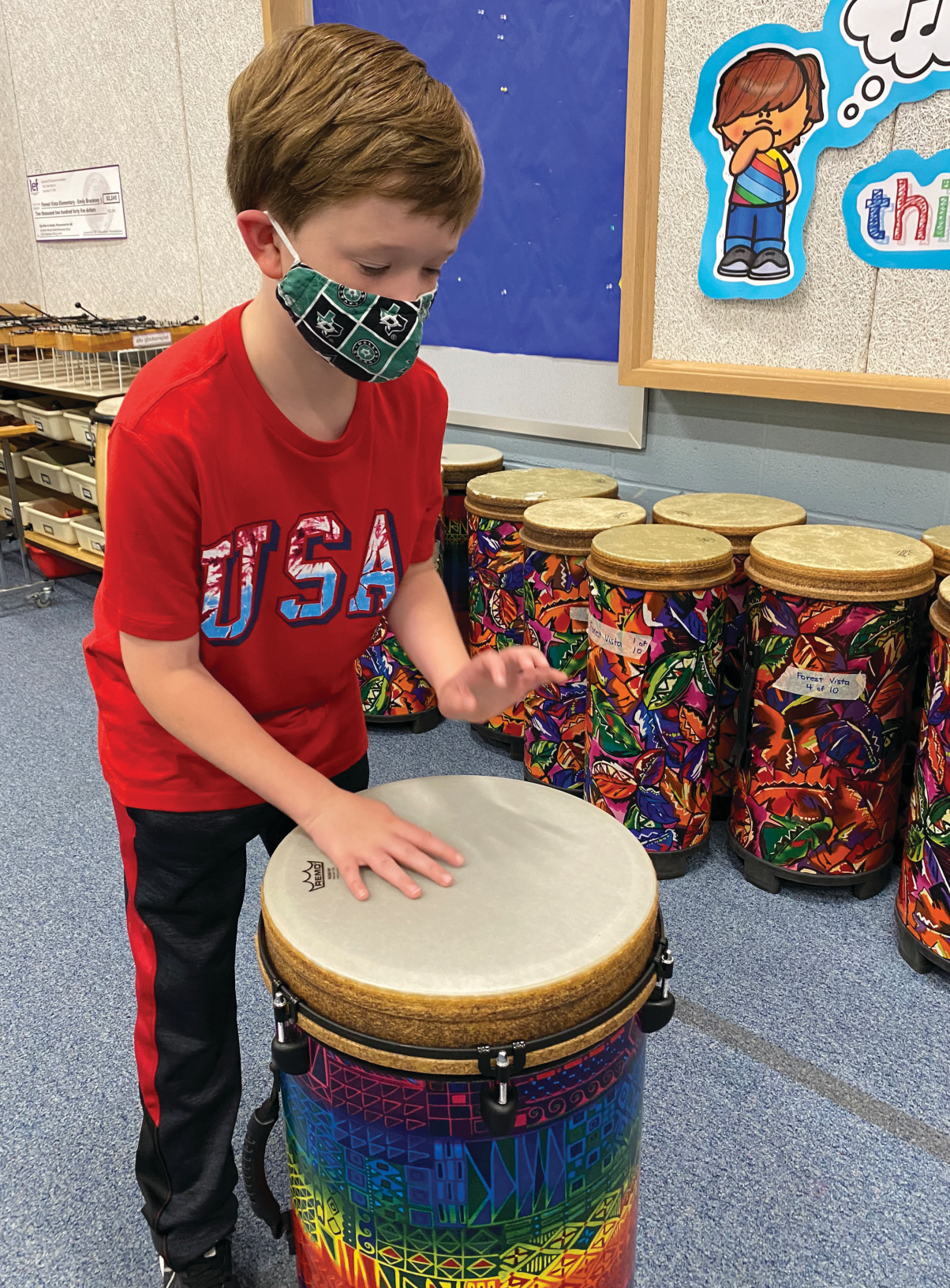

Tracking every penny that both passes through LEF and that is invested in our endowment is a crucial step in creating an atmosphere of transparency and accountability.

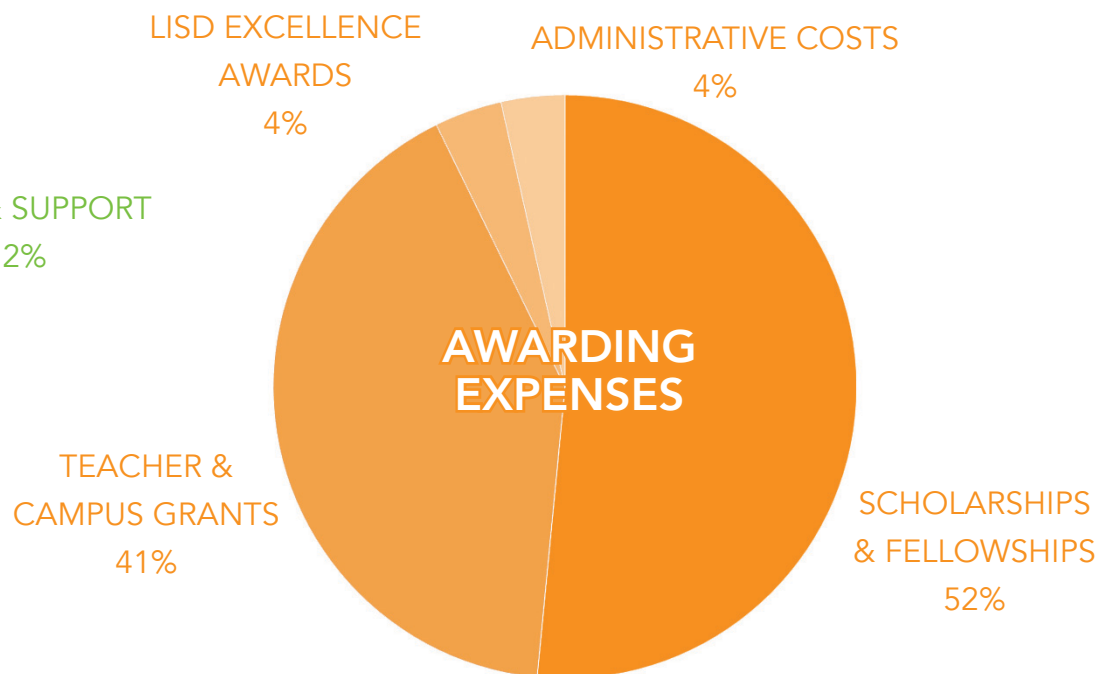
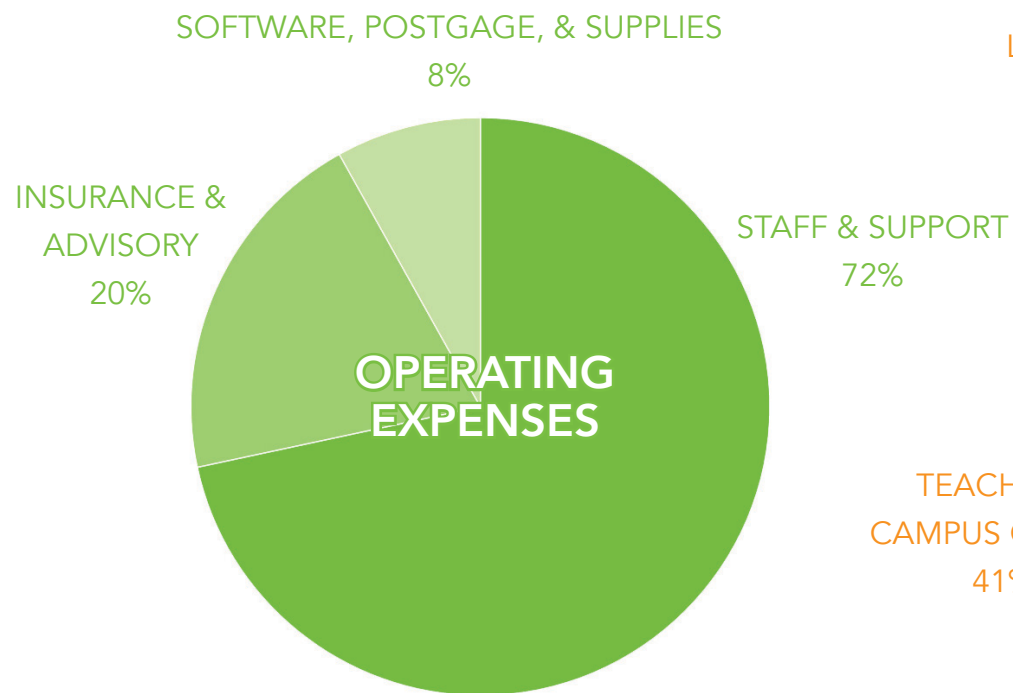
Over the course of the past year, the LEF Board of Directors worked diligently to create policies and procedures to enhance compliance with both federal and state regulations as well as protect gifts to the foundation.

In April, the Board adopted a new spending policy to supplement its existing investment policy to ensure the purchasing power of each endowment keeps pace with

current rates of inflation. The policy allows for reinvestment into each individual endowment during good market return years and protects the corpus value of each endowment during bad market return years.

With the new policy in place, the Board hopes that wise investment strategies and prudent spending produces enough sustainable growth.
